As 2025 comes to a close, we at the Humane Society of Barron County are reflecting on another year of hope, hard work, and countless wagging tails—all made possible by you.

Across the nation, shelters are facing a perfect storm: a record number of animals in need, longer shelter stays, and skyrocketing veterinary costs. Here at HSBC, we receive an overwhelming number of requests every single day from people desperate for help—lost pets, strays, and animals their families can no longer care for. Veterinary expenses continue to climb, and animals are spending longer periods in shelters before finding homes. With the costs of food, medication, and supplies also on the rise, every day of care counts more than ever.

One of those animals was Charlie Waffles, formerly known as Spot. Charlie came to us as a stray, his past a mystery. What we did know was that he was one of the kindest souls we'd ever met—a Certified Good Boy™ who sat politely for treats, wagged at every visitor, and melted hearts with his gentle manners.

For 71 days, Charlie waited patiently, hoping someone would see what we saw: a dog ready to start a new life. Then, one lucky day, his forever family walked through our doors—and Charlie's new life truly began. Now semi-regionally famous as "Charlie Waffles, the Medicare Mutt," he even has his own swag and social media fans who follow his adventures. These days, Charlie rides to work with his new humans, greets everyone he meets with that same trademark grin, and enjoys all the belly rubs he could ever want. His story reminds us that every single day of care—and every act of kindness—can change a life.

Then there's Claude and Chloe, a pair of 9-year-old cats who had spent their entire lives together before being surrendered to HSBC when their owner had to move somewhere pets weren't allowed. Claude was the outgoing one, while Chloe preferred to hang back and observe. Finding a home for bonded pairs can be challenging, but we were determined to keep them together. After 68 days in our care, they finally found their perfect match—a loving home where they could stay side by side, just as they always have.



Pre-planning, such as posting emergency phone numbers or bookmarking online resources for veterinary care and poison control can help if there is a problem.

Protecting your pets from holiday food that can really hurt them is a must! Sweet foods, unbaked yeast dough, and chocolate top the list, but check out the article for more information!

Decorations can cause deadly issues for pets. Tinsel and ornaments, holiday plants and candles are a few of the common hazards, but there are more!

Cold weather tips for furry family members

- Remember, if it's too cold for you, it's probably too cold for your pet, so keep your animals inside! Pets can freeze -- even inside a car!
- Keep your home humidified and **towel dry** your pet as soon as they come inside. Pay close attention to their feet and remove any snow chunks from between their toes or foot pads to prevent skin damage.
- Massage petroleum jelly or other **vet-approved paw protectants** into paw pads before going outside to protect from salt and chemical agents. **Booties** can provide even more coverage and can also prevent sand and salt from getting lodged between bare toes and causing irritation. Use **pet-friendly ice melts** whenever possible.
- **Never shave your dog down to the skin in winter.** A longer coat will provide more warmth. If your dog is long-haired, simply trim them to minimize the clinging ice balls, salt crystals and de-icing chemicals that can dry their skin, and don't neglect the hair between their toes. If your dog is short-haired, consider getting them a coat or sweater with a high collar or turtleneck with coverage from the base of the tail to the belly.
- **Bathe your pets as little as possible during cold spells.** Washing too often can remove essential oils and increase the chance of developing dry, flaky skin.
- Thoroughly clean up any **antifreeze spills**. Like coolant, antifreeze is a **lethal** for dogs and cats. Be sure to thoroughly clean up any spills from your vehicle, and consider using products that contain propylene glycol rather than ethylene glycol. Additionally, cold weather chemicals like ice melts can be dangerous when ingested, so always be mindful and keep chemicals up and out of paws' reach.
- Pets burn extra energy by trying to stay warm in wintertime. **Feeding them a little bit more** can provide much-needed calories, and making sure they have plenty of water to drink will help keep them well-hydrated and their skin less dry.
- For inside, a **cozy dog or cat bed** off the floor and away from drafts is perfect.
- **Never let your dog off leash on snow or ice**, especially during a snowstorm. Dogs can lose their scent in the snow and easily become lost. More dogs are lost during the winter than during any other season, so make sure your dog always wears an **ID tag**.
- Be sure to keep these tips top of mind this winter so that you and your furry friends can stay warm, cozy and safe.
